
## A University Center of Excellence • Minot State University



Mission Statement: To provide leadership and innovation that advances the state-of-the-art and to empower people with disabilities to challenge expectations, achieve personal goals and be included in all aspects of community life. Adopted by NDCPD Consumer Advisory Council, 2001.

In 2000, a national change was implemented in the UAP network. University Affiliated Programs (UAP) were renamed to University Centers of **Excellence on Developmental** Disabilities (UCEDD).





initiated by NDCPD leadership to support their mission and vision. Donations were foundation accounts: Endowment and Access. Interest income from these accounts were used in in a variety of ways that assisted the Center. From this, the ACCESS Scholarship was created. Scholarships were awarded to MSU students with significant disabilities. The first scholarship was given to Sherry Brook-Sanderson in 2005 for \$150. Later the scholarship was renamed to the Bryce M. Fifield Access Scholarship.
