Save The Date: 2022 Early Hearing Detection & Intervention Conference

The 21st Annual Early Hearing Detection & Intervention Conference will be held in Cincinnati, Ohio, March 13-15, 2022.

The goal of the annual EHDI Conference is to enhance the implementation of comprehensive state-based Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) programs. After participating in the conference, participants will be better able to:

Identify and promote knowledge and awareness of successful strategies for implementing comprehensive state-based EHDI programs that include screening, audiologic diagnostic evaluation, early intervention, medical home, reporting, tracking, surveillance, loss to follow-up issues, data integration, and other related surveillance components.

Interpret and describe current research and research methods related to EHDI.

Examine cultural competence of providers and assess their ability to work with children who are deaf or hard of hearing, their families, and communities.

Discuss the importance of enhancing and creating new and ongoing working relationships among federal agencies, non-profit organizations, state health departments and educational agencies, advocacy groups, families, and professionals. North Dakota has trained specialists to help families with infant and toddlers diagnosed with a hearing loss

One of the services provided by the North Dakota School for the Deaf/Resource Center for the Deaf and Hearing is the Parent-Infant Program for deaf and hard of hearing children, birth to five, and their families. It is a free statewide program and is family centered. They have uniquely trained professionals to address the distinctive impact of hearing loss in children. The program provides information to families and professionals statewide. Home visits are offered to families to provide unbiased information about hearing loss, auditory skills development and amplification, communication choices and technology options, development of sign language skills, networking with professionals, other parents, and deaf individuals.

Along with home visits PIP specialists consult in daycares and preschool settings. They are also available to participate in Individualized Family Service Plan meetings. On the parent-infant program team includes teachers of the deaf, parent-infant specialists, early childhood special educators, interpreter/sign language instructor and consulting audiologist.



Nicole Swartwout New Coordinator of Parent-Infant Program

The new coordinator of this program is Nicole Swartwout, who has been working as an Early Childhood Special Educator and a Teacher of the Deaf for 21 years. She received her undergrad in Deaf and Elementary Education from Minot State University and her Masters in Deaf Education and Early

Childhood Special Education from Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon. She has worked for a Special Education Coop in Minnesota, overseas with military families in Germany and in Washington DC at a private school for children with reduced hearing before returning to her hometown of Minot, North Dakota. She began working for the North Dakota School for the Deaf. This will be her 15th year on the Parent-Infant/School-Age Outreach team.

The Parent-Infant Program encourages parents to meet other families of children with differentiated hearing. Every year, they co-sponsor with North Dakota Hands & Voices a "Party with the Pumpkins" in each region. It is a Deaf Awareness Week activity which is September 19-25th this year. Because of the pumpkin season, however, scheduled dates continue through October.



Learn the Signs. Act Early is a program out of the CDC that helps families, caregivers, and medical providers monitor developmental milestones ages birth to 5. The program aims to improve early identification of children with autism and other developmental disabilities so children and families can get the services and supports they need.

Why Should You Monitor?

Monitoring your child's developmental milestones allows you to celebrate their successes as well as recognize when they may have fallen behind. The Learn the signs. Act Early materials follows milestones on how your child learns, speaks, acts, and moves. The materials also teach and empower parents to speak up when there is a concern and help find resources to get your child back on track. As a parent, you know your child best. If your child is not meeting the milestones for his or her age, or if you think there could be a problem with the way your child plays, learns, speaks, acts, and moves talk to your child's doctor and share your concerns. Do not wait. Acting early can make a real difference!

Each state has a dedicated Act Early Ambassador, appointed by the CDC. Your state ambassador can help you connect to the materials and resources in your area. North Dakota's state ambassador, Hilory Liccini, and co-project lead Vanessa Rovig, have been working with Head Start programs across the state to deliver the Learn the Signs. Act Early developmental monitoring materials to families across North Dakota. Some of the materials included:
