11 Ways to Stop Fraud

Your best defense against fraud is **YOU**! The year 2020 was a banner year for scammers, not only because of the usual fraud schemes, but they had a big financial take away from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Some things to do to defend yourself against fraud:

- Strengthen your password protection on accounts.
 - Set up dual-factor authentication on accounts. After you provide your name and password, you will get a unique code by text or email that you enter.
- Protect your mail.
 - Informed delivery is a free service from the U.S. Postal Service. The agency emails images
 of mail to be delivered which allows you to monitor what will be delivered.
- Check credit reports.
 - Currently Equifax, Experian and TransUnion are offering free weekly online reports through April 2021. Go to AnnualCreditReport.com
- Screen phone calls.
 - Enter all trusted contacts into your smartphone. Caller ID will let you know if it's one of them.
 Do not answer if you don't know the caller.
- Manage emails.
 - Mark suspicious or unwanted emails that show up in your inbox as spam, then similar messages will automatically be routed to your trash bin.
- Ensure privacy settings on Facebook accounts.
 - Go into Settings & Privacy and do a Privacy Checkup to ensure that only friends/family can view your profile and scammers will be locked out.
- Research unfamiliar e-retailers.
 - o Do a web search on the company name followed by the words "scam, fraud, complaints."
- Do not pay with gift cards.
 - Do not ever purchase a gift card to use as a form of payment.
- Copy contents of your wallet.
 - Copy front and back of all ID and credit cards and store in a safe place.
- Be wary of dating apps.
 - Extortion scammers look for victims on dating apps. Be careful of sending pictures.
- Stop, breath, ask questions.
 - Scammers often try to rush their victims into making decisions. Never allow strangers to force you into fast decisions.
