



North Dakota Law Enforcement Disability Awareness Modified 3-Hour Training

The First Responder Disability Awareness Training program at Niagara University is pleased to announce a modified 3-hour training for Law Enforcement personnel in the **State of North Dakota**. This is the nation's only comprehensive disability awareness training for law enforcement.

Developed with input from law enforcement from Virginia, South Dakota, Missouri and New York, this training both sensitizes and educates law enforcement on how to effectively identify, address, and respond to various disabilities they will encounter in their line of duty.

Content includes, but is not limited to, disabilities defined specific to law enforcement, community resources, the Americans with Disabilities Act, Recognize-Identify-Approach-Interact-Response (RIAIR) model, victimization/abuse, etiquette/interaction skills, CIT interface, service animals, and person/identity first language.

This modified training is developed to introduce disability awareness to Law Enforcement Personnel. This training is free.

About the Trainer – Captain Patrick Mann retired after a 32-year career with the Buffalo (NY) Police Department. He worked in patrol, administration, and training. His last assignment was Director of Training where he served for 17 years. Pat continues to instruct at the Erie County (NY) LEA. He is a member of the Law Enforcement Training Directors Association of New York State and the Lead Master Trainer for Law Enforcement Disability Awareness at Niagara University. This role extends to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, providing the same program through their Training Department.
