



The NHSTC is a competency-based course designed to provide the learner with a thorough understanding of the components necessary for conducting the quality newborn hearing screening. The recommended practices throughout the course are based on the Joint Committee on Infant Hearing (JCIH) Position Statement. Screeners and stakeholders will have the foundation to do a thorough job and feel confident in their roles by taking the course.

If your child does not pass their newborn hearing screening, they should receive a diagnosis from an audiologist by 3 months of age.

Early Intervention before 6 months of age

If your infant is diagnosed with permanent hearing loss, they should be provided the opportunity to enroll in early intervention services by 6 months of age.

Parent Support right from the start

Babies diagnosed with DHH will be referred to parent support to link them to services that can help them in this process.

A night with the Author



Hoping everyone will have a great Easter Season. Family Voices of North Dakota has an Extended Learning Call coming up on March 28th, 2023, @ 8 pm. We hope you will join us. Michelle Woodcock will join us to discuss "Why do we use Evidence-Based or Promising Practices in education? Not only is it good for kids, but it is also required by law (IDEA/ ESSA). This presentation will teach you about a mega literature review that narrowed down Evidence-Based and Promising Practices for students with behavioral health needs. Then four practices will be shared that NDDPI's Office of Specially Designed Services has selected to focus on this year. The Office of Specially Designed Services is providing training on these evidence-based practices to increase the graduation rate of students with disabilities (specifically students identified with emotional disturbance). These practices are things most parents and teachers do automatically. These strategies can be implemented at home or in school. You will learn how to implement them and track the fidelity of implementation. Additional resources from national technical assistance centers will be shared.

Additionally, FVND will host a Virtual Care Coordination Training for families. This two-part training is on April 4th and April 6th from 7:30 to 9 pm. This training will be offered by FVND staff to


